



INTEGRATING INTERACTIVE ACTIVITIES INTO ENGLISH LANGUAGE TEACHING: CHALLENGES AND OPPORTUNITIES

Group activities help learners develop social skills together with language skills. However, group work should be well organized. These activities help students practice appropriate vocabulary, grammar, pronunciation, and polite expressions. They also develop fluency and confidence because students learn to react quickly in different communicative situations. Simulations can be used for more complex tasks, such as organizing a meeting, solving a social problem, or presenting a business idea.

Discussions and debates help students express opinions and develop critical thinking. In discussions, students share ideas on a topic and listen to different viewpoints. In debates, they learn to support their opinions with arguments and examples. These activities are effective for improving speaking fluency, vocabulary, logical thinking, and confidence. They also teach students to respect others' opinions and respond politely. For successful discussions, teachers should choose interesting and level-appropriate topics. Students may also need useful phrases for agreeing, disagreeing, giving examples, and asking questions.

Language games can also support interactive learning. Games create a positive classroom atmosphere and reduce students' fear of making mistakes. They can be used for vocabulary revision, grammar practice, pronunciation training, and speaking development. For example, word games, guessing games, role cards, quizzes, and team competitions can make learning more enjoyable. At the same time, games should not be used only for entertainment. They should have a clear learning purpose and be connected with the lesson objectives.

Problem-solving tasks are another effective form of interaction. In these tasks, students work together to find solutions to real or imaginary problems. For example, they may plan a trip, choose the best candidate for a job, solve a classroom problem, or discuss ways to protect the environment. Such activities require students to use English for communication, negotiation, and decision-making. They also develop creativity and cooperation.

Project-based activities provide wider opportunities for interactive language learning. Students can prepare presentations, posters, videos, interviews, surveys, or digital stories. During project work, learners search for information, discuss ideas, divide responsibilities, prepare materials, and present results. This process helps students use English in a practical and meaningful way. Project work also develops independent learning, responsibility, teamwork, and presentation skills.

Despite many advantages, integrating interactive activities into English lessons may create some challenges. One common problem is large class size. When there are many students in one classroom, it can be difficult for the teacher to monitor all pairs or groups. Some students may remain passive while others dominate the activity. To solve this problem, teachers should give clear tasks, set time limits, and assign roles to students. They should also move around the classroom and observe students' work.



Another challenge is students' fear of speaking. Some learners may be afraid of making mistakes or being laughed at by classmates. This problem can be reduced by creating a friendly and supportive classroom atmosphere. Teachers should encourage students and explain that mistakes are a natural part of learning. Correction should be helpful and respectful. It is also useful to begin with simple activities and gradually move to more difficult tasks.

Limited time can also be a challenge. Interactive activities often require preparation, explanation, performance, and feedback. Teachers may worry that they cannot cover all textbook materials. However, interactive tasks can be integrated into regular lessons without taking too much time. Even short pair discussions, quick interviews, or five-minute group tasks can make a lesson more active and effective.

Assessment is another important issue. If students are assessed only through written grammar tests, they may not take interactive activities seriously. Therefore, teachers should include speaking tasks, presentations, dialogues, participation, portfolios, and project work in assessment. Clear criteria and rubrics can help make assessment more objective. Students should understand that communication, cooperation, and active participation are important parts of language learning.
