This article examines the relationship between historical truth and artistic truth in historical novels through an IMRAD-based approach. In addition, examples from Uzbek historical prose, especially the works of Abdulla Qodiriy and Pirimqul Qodirov, are discussed to demonstrate the interaction between historical reliability and literary creativity. The findings reveal that successful historical novels maintain a balance between factual accuracy and artistic interpretation, enabling readers to understand history emotionally as well as intellectually.

Georg Lukacs argued that historical novels should reveal the social and psychological realities of a historical period rather than merely repeat historical facts. According to Lukács, the true purpose of historical fiction is to show how ordinary individuals are shaped by historical circumstances. Similarly, Hayden White emphasized that historical narratives themselves contain elements of interpretation and storytelling. In his view, historians and novelists both construct narratives, although their methods and objectives differ.

In Uzbek literature, historical novels occupy a significant place in the development of national consciousness. Writers such as Abdulla Qodiriy, Oybek, and Pirimqul Qodirov used historical themes to explore social transformation, moral values, patriotism, and the destiny of the



nation. For example, O'tkan Kunlar (Past Days) not only describes nineteenth-century Turkestan but also reflects social conflicts, family relationships, and national identity through artistic characterization. Likewise, Yulduzli Tunlar artistically reconstructs the life and historical environment of Zahiriddin Muhammad Bobur. The harmony between historical truth and artistic truth is essential because excessive fictionalization may distort history, while excessive factual detail may reduce literary quality. Therefore, historical novelists face the challenge of balancing authenticity with creativity. The purpose of this article is to analyze the interaction between artistic truth and historical truth in historical novels and to examine how writers combine factual history with artistic imagination.

This study employs a qualitative literary analysis based on comparative and interpretative methods. The research focuses on theoretical concepts related to historical fiction and examines selected historical novels from world and Uzbek literature. Historical novels often include diverse ideological positions and social viewpoints. National Literary Tradition. The study also considers the contributions of Uzbek literary scholars and writers who explored the role of historical fiction in preserving cultural memory and national identity. The selected texts for analysis include: O'tkan Kunlar; Yulduzli Tunlar; selected examples from world historical literature.

The analysis focuses on: representation of historical events; characterization of historical figures; artistic imagination; realism and symbolism; ideological and moral interpretation.

Similarly, Pirmqul Qodirov used historical materials about Zahiriddin Muhammad Bobur while writing Yulduzli Tunlar. Historical events such as political struggles, military campaigns, and dynastic conflicts are grounded in documented history. The findings indicate that historical truth provides credibility and educational value to literary works. Artistic Imagination and Emotional Depth. While historical truth establishes factual authenticity, artistic truth gives emotional and psychological depth to the narrative. Writers often create fictional dialogues, inner monologues, symbolic scenes, and dramatic conflicts that may not exist in historical records. These artistic



elements help readers emotionally connect with historical characters and events. For instance, in *O'tkan Kunlar*, the love story between Otabek and Kumush serves not only as a personal narrative but also as a reflection of broader social and cultural tensions. The analysis reveals that artistic truth: humanizes historical figures; strengthens emotional impact; reveals moral and philosophical meanings; transforms history into lived experience.

**Representation of Historical Personalities.** Historical novels frequently reinterpret famous historical figures. Writers aim to present these personalities not only as political leaders but also as human beings with emotions, fears, and moral dilemmas. In *Yulduzli Tunlar*, Zahiriddin Muhammad Bobur is portrayed as both a ruler and a sensitive intellectual. His emotional struggles, loneliness, and dreams are emphasized alongside his political achievements. This approach allows readers to perceive historical figures more realistically and empathetically. **Social and National Consciousness.** Historical novels also contribute to the formation of cultural identity and historical memory. Uzbek historical prose often reflects themes such as: patriotism; national awakening; cultural preservation; social justice. The study shows that writers use artistic truth to strengthen emotional attachment to national history and values.

Thus, historical fiction becomes a medium for philosophical reflection and social criticism. Hayden White argued that even historians shape events into narratives through interpretation. This perspective suggests that complete objectivity in historical representation is impossible. Therefore, artistic interpretation is not necessarily opposed to historical truth. However, excessive fictionalization may create historical distortion. Some writers romanticize historical figures or oversimplify complex events for dramatic effect. Such approaches can weaken historical authenticity. Successful historical novels maintain balance by: respecting historical evidence; preserving cultural context; using imagination responsibly; avoiding ideological distortion.

Uzbek literary scholars have emphasized the educational role of historical fiction. Historical novels introduce readers to national history while also developing moral and spiritual awareness. Another important issue is psychological realism. Historical documents often focus on political events, while literature reveals emotional and personal experiences. Through artistic truth, writers explore love, fear, ambition, loyalty, betrayal, and inner conflict. In this sense, historical fiction complements historical science rather than competing with it. Modern readers are increasingly interested in historical novels because they provide both knowledge and emotional engagement. Historical fiction helps contemporary society understand cultural roots, historical continuity, and national identity.
