



THE SIGNIFICANCE OF LANGUAGE IN THE PROCESS OF GLOBALIZATION

Moreover, it is observed that “The dominance of English has also influenced language policies across nations, where it is frequently prioritized in educational systems and professional environments”, which demonstrates how governments and institutions adapt their policies to align with global linguistic trends. This finding suggests that language planning and educational strategies are increasingly shaped by global demands rather than local needs. Additionally, the study identifies ongoing linguistic transformations as a result of intercultural communication, as shown in the statement, “New vocabulary, grammatical structures, and communication styles emerges speakers of different languages interact. The spread of international media, digital communication platforms, and the dominance of global markets facilitate these linguistic transformations”, which indicates that globalization contributes to the dynamic evolution of languages. However, this dominance also raises concerns about linguistic inequality, as not all languages receive equal recognition or institutional support. The influence of English on language policies across nations further demonstrates how globalization shapes educational systems and professional standards, often prioritizing global competitiveness over local linguistic diversity. As a result, language becomes not only a tool for inclusion but also a factor that can contribute to exclusion in global contexts. Consequently, the economic dimension of language highlights both opportunities and challenges associated with globalization.
